STATE YOUTH LIVESTOCK SHOW - SFVA

The State Fair of Virginia hosted the Youth Livestock Shows September 29 - October 2, 2022 at the historic Meadow Event Park in Doswell, VA. Over 364 youth from 52 counties and independent cities were represented. These youth brought 1,253 head of beef cattle, sheep, market goats and swine.
