<u>Course Description</u>: The greenhouse industry is one of the most highly technical and high value sectors of agricultural production. This course will prepare students who intend to manage (or advise those managing) commercial, institutional, educational, or research greenhouses. This is a marvelous field that is rapidly gaining interest. I hope you enjoy the course!

<u>Prerequisites</u>: Fundamental coursework in plant propagation, environmental factors, plant physiology OR similar experience.

<u>Course Objectives</u>: Upon successful completion of the course, you should be able to:

- 1. Locate and access literature and resources pertinent to greenhouse construction and management
- 2. Discuss the characteristics of various types of greenhouses
- 3. Explain all elements of environmental controls utilized in greenhouses
- 4. Outline costs associated with greenhouse construction and production
- 5. Identify greenhouse pests and pathogens and know where to access information on their control
